Charles Burnand Gallery presents *Ethereal Monoliths* at PAD London (October 2025), redefining monumentality in contemporary design. This exhibition brings together a diverse group of international designers whose practices push material boundaries while remaining deeply rooted in craft.

From hand-silvered glass and charred iroko wood, to lacquered copper, and gilded oak, the works explore how scale and surface can move between solidity and lightness, between structure and atmosphere. Collectively, they highlight a new direction in collectible design; one where monumental presence does not rely on mass alone, but on resonance, transformation, and awe

Together, these works form *Ethereal Monoliths*: an exhibition that places material experimentation and monumental form at the centre of contemporary design, offering new ways of understanding presence, perception, and transformation.

DEGLAN

DEGLAN was established by the artist-architect duo Domenic Degner and Falko Landenberger. Hailing from Berlin and Heidelberg, and sharing a background in architectural education, their bond has naturally evolved into a symbiotic design language, the hallmark of which is the amalgamation of organic, often imperfect or asymmetric forms - a nod to the irregularities found in nature - with flawlessly finished surfaces that lend an understated elegance to each piece. Each piece is handcrafted by them in their Berlin-based workshop for an internationally acclaimed clientele.










MARC FISH

Marc Fish is a British designer and maker celebrated for pushing the boundaries between fine furniture, sculpture, and design art. Blending meticulous craftsmanship with experimental techniques, Fish creates works that explore the relationship between nature, form, and material innovation. His practice sits at the crossroads of traditional woodworking and contemporary design, with a particular focus on layered construction, biomorphic forms, and the tactile elegance of natural materials.












STUDIO FURTHERMORE

Studio Furthermore Home to Marina Dragomirova & lain Howlett, Studio Furthermore seeks out new kinds of material and cultural realities informed by processes occurring in nature. Having met at the Royal College of Art the studio was founded in Shoreditch in 2015. Studio Furthermore creates editioned design pieces in glass, ceramic, metal, Lava and other materials blending aspects of craft with future narratives. Characteristically the studio engages at a material level to develop a process from which design narratives are realised.












Cast bronze, aluminium, LED 3 size options, H. 30, H.40, H.50










STUDIO FURTHERMORE | Space Lava Vase - White Magma | 2023

Cast recycled aluminium, paint H. 36 x W. 11 x D. 11 cm H. 15 x W. 4 3/8 x D. 4 3/8 inches










STUDIO FURTHERMORE | Space Lava Vase - Verdi Bronze | 2023

KYEOK KIM


Kyeok Kim mastery begins with her materials. Copper wire, traditionally associated with industrial and functional purposes, is transformed through an intricate process of crochet-a method she employs to create complex, lattice-like structures. Each wire is meticulously intertwined, forming patterns that balance strength and delicacy. Once these forms are constructed, Kim, applies layers of Ottchil lacquer, a traditional Korean varnish derived from tree sap. This labour-intensive process requires patience and skill, as multiple layers are built up, polished, and refined to achieve a luminous, durable finish that enhances the texture and form of each piece.






YANXIONG LIN

Yanxiong Lin graduated with a BA in Product Design from the China Academy of Art and went on to further his studies at Central Saint Martins for his MA in Design, where he graduated with distinction.

Lin's furniture and design objects, from his inaugural collection 'A Window to the Past' are somehow familiar in form, acknowledging the present, with a nod to the past, yet looking to the future and so creating works of another dimension, time and civilisation. Working with wood, Washi paper, Urushi lacquer and bronze, Lin calls into question social and cultural dynamics through the forms, materials, and processes he has selected. His work sits in the permanent collection of the SHAANXI OPERA HOUSE AND XI'AN CONCERT HALL.








YANXIONG LIN | Serpentine | 2025

MYUNGTAEK JUNG

Korean artist, **Myungtaek Jung** is a leading figure in Korean art furniture, known for seamlessly integrating traditional Korean aesthetics with modern design. His work explores the philosophical and spatial properties of materials, transforming furniture from functional objects into contemplative art. Rooted in the principles of Korean architecture, particularly the notions of muwi (the absence of activity), mushim (the absence of mind or desire), and muhyung (the absence of shape), Jung reinterprets these elements through a contemporary lens.



YAREIN PYUN

Yarein Pyun is a Seoul-based ceramic artist whose practice bridges material sensitivity and poetic form. She completed her BFA in Ceramic Arts and Design at Seoul National University of Science and Technology in 2019 and her MA at the Royal College of Art in London in 2024. Pyun has exhibited internationally, including at Ttukseom Art Museum in South Korea. Yaerin's work is inspired by the natural surroundings of where she used to live in South Korea, which included mountains, rivers, and lots of snow in the winter. She creates ceramics that explore the complexity of nature and translate her experiences and emotions from that familiar natural world of her heritage into her work.

WEON RHEE

Seoul-based artist **Weon Rhee** explores the tension between growth and decay, formation and collapse, working within the liminal space where organic and structural forces remain in flux. His sculptural practice foregrounds incompletion, fracture, and imperfection-not as shortcomings, but as sites of generative potential. This interest in instability, both as a natural state and a philosophical condition, underpins a body of work that is at once materially rigorous and emotionally resonant. For Weon Rhee, making is not a quest for resolution, but a form of inquiry-an attempt to understand the ever-evolving state of things.










JAN WATERSTON


Ash, fumed fade lacquer


