Charles Burnand Gallery unveils '**Objects of Permanence**' bringing together a curated selection of contemporary works that resist the transient and speak to lasting value. These are objects defined not by trend, but by material intelligence, conceptual depth, and the quiet authority of craftsmanship.

Featuring works by DEGLAN, DenHolm, Kyeok Kim, Yanxiong Lin, Jean Gabriel Neukomm, Reynold Rodriguez, Mia Jung, Simon Stewart, Yearin Pyun, Kyouhong Lee, and Jan Waterston, this exhibition interrogates conventional notions of form and function. Each piece is sculptural in essence, not designed for immediacy, but for endurance. These are works that reveal themselves slowly, through shadow, surface, and structural tension. They resist quick comprehension, instead inviting prolonged engagement, their power lies not in novelty, but in permanence and the ability to hold space.

Among the highlights is **DEGLAN's** Eido Dining Table, a substantial piece and the first in a new line of works. Crafted in their Berlin workshop, the table is shaped, carved, and sanded entirely by hand from a solid wooden base, and then finished layer by layer using techniques influenced by centuries-old Italian and Japanese craftsmanship.

Whilst monumental in their scale, the intricate craftsmanship of **Kyeok Kim's** works provide a fascinating contrast to the larger, more substantial works in the exhibition. Crafted using copper wire that Kim crochets, then covers with ottchil, carbon, and sawdust, bring a fresh perspective to materiality and light.

At the heart of the exhibition, **Jean Gabriel Neukomm's** Lucen's Chandelier adds a touch of luminous elegance, while Harnessing the Elements by Simon Stewart, a monumental chandelier

crafted entirely from gold mica, explores the tension between nature's raw power and refined artistry. This striking piece is a bold addition to the exhibition, evoking both the elemental and the sublime.

Jan Waterston's Primitive Excavation and Self-Mining Lounge Chair are sculptural meditations on process, introspection, and the raw power of material. Finished in limed and black-stained tones, these works bridge ancient natural forces and contemporary reflection, revealing design as both physical and emotional archaeology.

The exhibition also introduces **Yanxiong Lin's** Evaporate Table, alongside his Dawn's Embrace Floor Lamp, both works offering a unique, cohesive experience of light, materiality, and space.

"Rather than looking back nostalgically, Objects of Permanence looks forward, toward a design language grounded in integrity, in process, and in the belief that contemporary works can still carry the weight of legacy. In a culture saturated with the disposable, these works hold their ground. They are not passing moments, but lasting markers and artefacts of permanence in an impermanent world.."
